Captain Green's Green Facts

Eighty per cent of all plants, insects and animals live in forests. This makes forests one of the most important ecosystems on earth. An ecosystem is an area where plants, animals and insects live and depend on one another to survive. But ecosystems are destroyed when trees and forests are cut down for things that humans want, such as paper, furniture and wood, or burned for farmland to grow crops.

Trees are like the Earth's superheroes. Just like Captain Green, they work hard to help our planet. They help to keep the climate cool, filter water through their roots, and create the air we breathe by absorbing a gas called carbon dioxide and making oxygen.

Some animals are endangered which means they are at risk of becoming extinct or not being alive anymore. Hornbills, pygmy elephants and orangutans live in South East Asia. Like many other animals all around the world, they are losing the ecosystems that are their homes and food sources. Just like humans, all animals need food to eat and a safe place to sleep.

Plant a tree or two! Trees take years to mature – measure yourself growing alongside them!

Help Save the Forests!

Use recycled paper and cardboard for drawing and painting. Write on both sides and then recycle it again when you're finished!

Ask your parents to buy foods like bananas, chocolate and coffee that are grown in a sustainable way. That means they are safe for the environment, for wildlife, and for people.

Enormous areas of rainforest are cleared each year to make room to grow the palm trees that produce palm oil. Ask your parents to read the labels when shopping for food and toiletries to check that any palm oil in them is from a sustainable source. This means they are farmed in a way that does not harm the planet.

Eat less meat. Lots of forests are cut down just to make space to farm animals for people to eat.

Avoid wasting food. By only producing the food we need, we save land, water and energy.
